Isa 50.4-7

Does the king of glory make his way into your heart and house? Jesus arrived in Jerusalem fully aware of the rejection, betrayal, and execution that awaited him. But the Jerusalem populace was prepared to receive him as their Messiah! As the promised Messiah, Jesus enters Jerusalem in humility and meekness, bringing triumph and peace to his people.

According to Isaiah 50.4–7, a suffering servant eventually discovers the meaning of obedience via his suffering. Moreover, by his proclamation, the servant creates conflict, but he chooses to embrace it rather than take this suffering in silence. This passage helps us comprehend Jesus' journey to resurrection via the cross, and it also reminds us that discipleship comes at a cost. Thus, embodying God's calling will occasionally come at a cost in the life of a Christian.

The Passion is centered on sacrificial thought. The ultimate sacrifice was made by Jesus during his Passion, when he willingly surrendered his life at the foot of the cross as payment for all of humanity's sins. Moreover, this act of selflessness is central to Christian doctrine. That the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross allows believers to be eligible for grace and forgiveness. Jesus also serves as an example of forgiveness since, despite being persecuted, beaten, and ultimately put to death, he spared his oppressors and showed compassion for those who wronged him. One of the most impactful parts of the Passion is its message of love and forgiveness, which still motivates us today. Nonetheless, many of us might devote to Christ with great fervor and happiness all our resources, including our health and strength, but we find it difficult to bear the cost of our reputation or suffering for Him. Nevertheless, our pain can serve as a means of introducing people to Christ and guiding them toward faith. This is because you have seen firsthand his enduring grace as well as his deliberate design. May Christ's passion strengthen our faith.
